Learning history is more than about looking into the past. It also means examining complex ideas of previous events to help us understand what's happening now and to chart a more successful future. This deep exploration hones critical thinking, analysis and writing skills—the foundation for a successful career in almost any occupation.

The program offers a wide array of courses in U.S., European, Asian, and Latin American history as well as mentoring, internships, and community. The education concentration prepares students interested in teaching to enter a Single Subject Secondary Education program upon graduation.

Experience Your Learning

History students have ample opportunity to work with fellow students and the local community through internships, workshops, and other special events.

In the Senior Seminar in History, a capstone course, students use and refine the research, critical thinking, oral presentation, and writing skills they learned as History majors to pursue research projects and write research papers.

The annual Career Workshop helps students find career opportunities in almost any field as they translate history knowledge into their cover letters, resumes, and interviews.

At the Humboldt Student History Conference, students present their research to peers, the History faculty, and the public, and a scholar from outside the area is brought in to deliver a keynote address.

The History Internship program places students with local museums, libraries, parks, and local government offices to gain experience with Public History.

- **History Club students were the first undergraduates to attend the American Historical Association meeting, and the club's consistent attendance led the AHA to start supporting undergrads with a reception, poster presentations, and a career fair.**
- **Student writing tutors—History majors who have mastered writing—are available to support their fellow students' success.**

Get Involved
